

GUIDELINES FOR CLUB RIDERS

NYCC rides are intended to be friendly group rides; we don't like to "drop" or lose anyone. Riders whose personal or bicycle condition seems inadequate for the ride are to be turned back by the leader. Our leaders are truly reluctant to do this, so please cooperate with them:

- 1) Select rides within your capabilities--avoid downgrading the ride for your fellow riders and stressing yourself "trying to keep up"; or, conversely, demanding a faster pace than advertised.
- 2) Be on time or a bit early. Rides will leave promptly.
- Have your bike in good condition: both brakes working, properly inflated tires, adjusted derailleurs, no loose parts.
- 4) Eat a good breakfast; bring water, snacks, spare tube, patch kit, pump; and lights for dark.

RIDE AND RIDER CLASSIFICATIONS

(See, also, the detailed classification graph in the Feb. 1981 Bulletin) Riding pace +: ANIMALS: Anything goes. Eat up the roads, hills and all.

- A. SPORTS(WO)MEN: Vigorous riding over hill and dale. High regard for good riding 14-17 mph style. Can take care of themselves anywhere. Stops every two hours or so.
- B: TOURISTS: Moderate to brisk riding along scenic roads, including hills; destination 11-14 mph not so important. Stops every hour or two.
- C: SIGHTSEERS: Leisurely to moderate riding. Destination oriented: nature, historical, cultural. Stops every half to one hour.
- D: BEGINNERS: Very leisurely sightseeing. Discovering the bike and their bodies;
 training up to C. Frequent stopping and regrouping. Do not believe 8 mph
 reports about mere mortals riding 100 miles or more in only one day.

SYDSSET QUICKIE. "A" - 55 miles. Meet Bob Friedman at 9:00AM at the C.P. Boathouse for a ride to the Friendly's in Syosset. Info:724-4246.

Saturdays November 7th, 14th, 28th and Sundays November 22nd and 29th. LEADERLESS RIDES. "A" — approximately 50-80 miles. Meet 9:00AM at the C.P. Boathouse. Destination to be decided by the riders who show up.

HACKENSACK SUBMARINE. "0+" - 40 miles. Some nice hills, one not nice hill(see below). Meet Ed Schweber at 9:00AM at th Central Park Boathouse for a ride across the G.W. Bridge to visit a WWII submarine docked on the Hackensack River(admission \$2.00); loop around Teterboro Airport(for you small plane freaks); take a detour to the Meadowlands Sports Complex and ride through the Northern fringes of the Meadowlands themselves(which viewed from the right angle and with the right attitude are actually quite pretty). 
